## School Bus Safety Week: October 16-22

Schools throughout Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) are celebrating School Bus Safety Week from October 16-22. The theme: 'Make the World Green, Ride Yellow,' which focuses on transportation choice and the environment. Throughout the week, various activities are planned, including information sessions, bus-safety lesson plans and bus-evacuation drills.

In addition, students are participating in the Alberta Student Transportation Advisory Council's province-wide poster contest, open to kindergarten to Grade 6. Each winner—one from each grade level—whose poster best illustrates the theme, 'Make the World Green, Ride Yellow,' will receive a \$25 gift card, a framed original of their poster, an engraved plaque and \$100 for their classroom.

As part of School Bus Safety Week, Bruderheim School reminds students and families that all Division school buses are equipped with a bus-pass scanner, GPS technology, the Child Check-Mate system and surveillance equipment, which allows Student Transportation to better monitor and manage its more than 170 buses. Families and students also have access to the Traversa Ride 360 app, a mobile tool to help determine the location of a bus, projected arrival times and when a child is scanned onto a bus.

# Caregiver Education Sessions: October Sessions

Alberta Health Services offers free online programming for parents and caregivers of children and youth. Sessions are offered through Zoom. Upcoming topics include understanding anxiety, supporting children and adolescents with ADHD and parenting in the 21st century. The list of October 2022 sessions is now available.

## **Enhancing Literacy and Numeracy**

As part of Elk Island Public Schools' (EIPS) ongoing efforts to enhance the literacy and numeracy of students in all grade levels, the Division is once again administering the Star Early Literacy and Star Reading assessment tools in the 2022-23 school year. The Division's also launching a new assessment called Star Math. These tools focus on literacy and numeracy, are digitally based and offer an opportunity for students to demonstrate their learning. The goal: To provide timely information to teachers, help enhance classroom instruction and identify student learning needs.

Three times a year, EIPS students in Grade 1 complete the Star Early Literacy assessment and students in grades 2-12 complete the Star Reading assessment. Both assessments are administered electronically and take about 20 minutes. Students in grades 2 through 10 also complete the Star Math, a mathematic screening tool. It, too, is administered electronically and takes about 30 minutes for students to complete. The results offer teachers a clearer picture of a student's learning needs and help determine if subsequent instructional planning is required. NOTE: Semester students complete the Star Math twice, at the start and end of the course.

In addition to the Star assessments, Alberta Education now mandates that all students in grades 1-3 complete additional literacy and numeracy assessments. Students in Grade 2 and Grade 3 completed these provincial assessments in September. Grade 1 students will complete the assessments in January 2023. EIPS also administers the assessments to all Grade 4 students to gauge learning loss from the pandemic, which the Division is now analyzing.

The scores of the assessments aren't used toward a student's grade, and there is no need to study ahead of time. The tools simply provide the teacher with information to better understand where each student is in terms of reading comprehension and mathematic ability. If, after analyzing the results, it's determined that a student can benefit from extra support, the teacher will contact the family to discuss possible support strategies.

## **Introducing Permission Click**

EIPS has begun migrating school and Division forms to the online Permission Click platform. Many families will have already received one or more forms within the new system. Permission Click makes the form submission process for families simple and straightforward. Forms are also easily accessible and fillable from your mobile device. Families will generally receive forms in one of two ways—sent as a link within a SchoolMessenger email or in a direct email from Permission Click sent to the first parent or guardian on record in PowerSchool. Be sure to add <a href="mailto:notifications@permissionclick.com">notifications@permissionclick.com</a> to your safe sender list to ensure required forms aren't mistakenly directed to your junk mail folder.

## Pay School Fees Online!

School fee information for the 2022-23 school year is now posted on the PowerSchool Parent Portal. All fees are due within 30 days of being posted. To access your fee information, simply log in to the PowerSchool Parent Portal and go to "Student Fees." There you can view your fees and pay them online.

Don't forget to also log in to the PowerSchool Parent Portal regularly throughout the year. Fees are often added to your child's account to cover the cost of various school activities such as field trips, class projects, extracurricular activities fees and more.

If circumstances exist where you are unable to pay your fees, you can apply to have certain fees waived by submitting an Application for a Waiver of Fees. The application deadline is December 15th, 2022.

# Request For Christmas And Holiday Themed Artwork

The Division is seeking submissions of Christmas and holiday-themed artwork to be used for the Board of Trustees official greeting cards. We're looking for seasonal and winter images in the unique, creative style only students can provide. Those whose work is selected will be advised.

Guidelines and information for art submission:

- Finished card size will be 5" x 7" but larger art may be submitted—standard letter-sized, for example.
- Artwork may be vertical or horizontal.
- Artwork may be created on any paper and with any medium as long as it can be properly scanned—thick 3D art orart larger than 8.5" x 11" may not work.
- Avoid including words of any kind—let the art tell the story!
- Avoid including the student's name on the art. If included, first name only.
- Submit the full name, grade and school along with the artwork when sending it in the courier. Note: Only the first name and grade will appear on the finished cards in conjunction with the EIPS logo.
- Originals are needed for scanning; they'll be returned to the school.

\*NOTE: Scanned artwork may be resized and cropped to fit the cards and best display the art.

To be considered, all artwork must be received by **November 1**.

## Student Artwork At Central Services

Central Services is looking for temporary collections of student artwork to display in its front reception area. We're displaying this artwork on a rotating basis to provide the opportunity for multiple schools to be involved. Each school's rotation will be

one- to two-months long, depending on the interest received from across the Division. All artwork will be returned at the end of each rotation.

Frames at Central Services can fit artwork up to 16 inches by 20 inches (landscape or portrait). Alternatively, you may have artwork that doesn't require a frame or your own frames of other sizes that work. The 16-foot shelf will fit up to eight frames—depending on the frame orientation. We also have a second set of display shelves for smaller artwork and a display case for small, three-dimensional pieces. 

# Parents promoting positive mental health

Parents play an important role in supporting a child's mental health.

Mental health affects the way you think, feel and act.

You can promote good mental health by the things you do, say, and the environment you create at home.

#### Ask questions about feelings

Help your child name and calm feelings; start by asking how they feel.

Let them know that it's OK to talk about feelings.

Feelings are not right or wrong, and you can't control how you feel.

You can control how to act when you have strong feelings.

#### Focus on strengths

When your child brings home a test, talk first about a what they did well instead of focusing on mistakes.

If improvement is needed, ask your child what they could do better next time

Have suggestions ready if they ask you.

#### Listen and show empathy

Stop what you are doing and look at your child when you talk to them.

Listen to what your child is saying about their feelings without judgement.

Put yourself in their place.

Acknowledge what your child is feeling.
